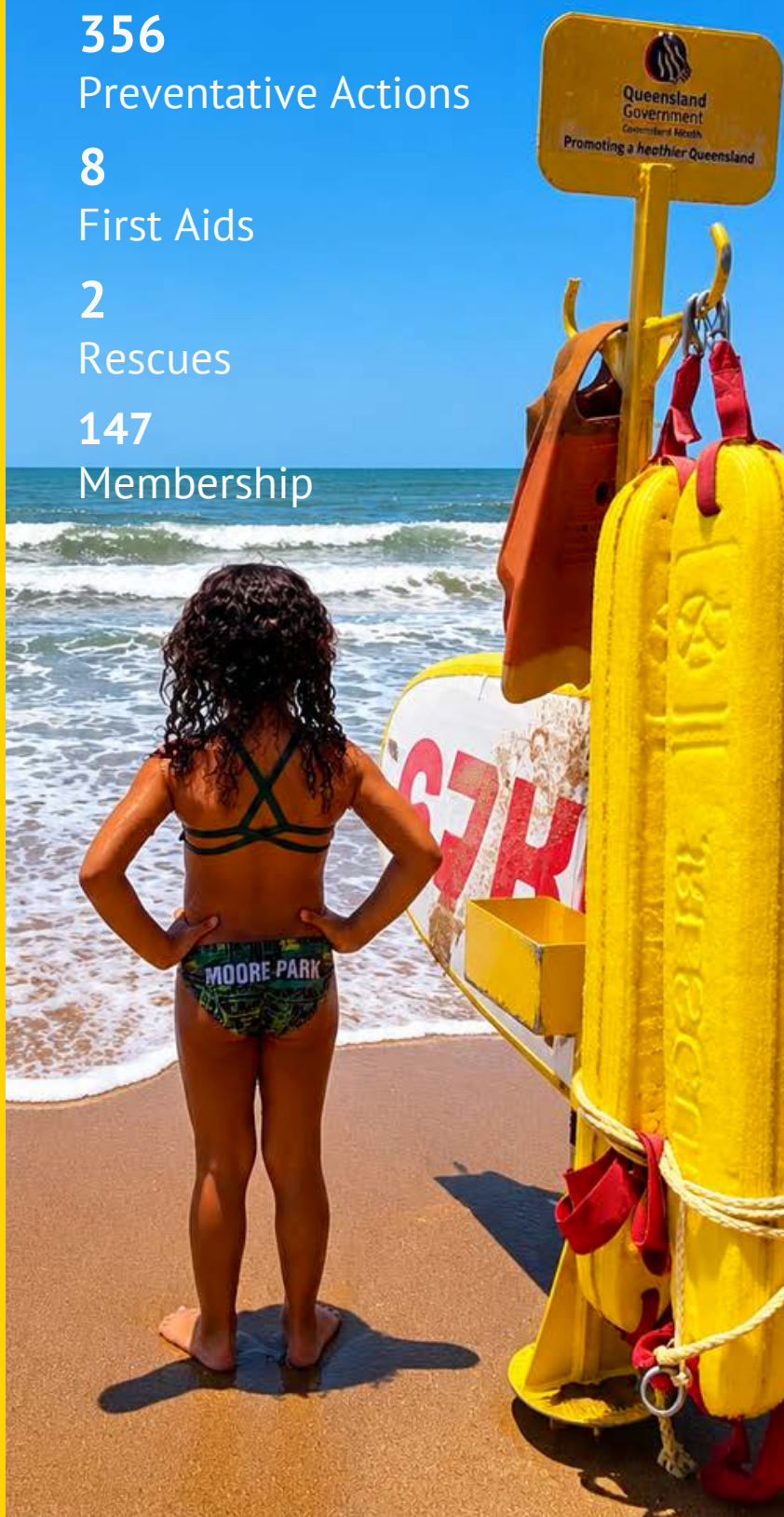

President's Report

The 2025–2026 season has been a defining year for Moore Park Surf Life Saving Club—one of transition, momentum, and measurable growth as we moved into strengthening our operational future.

Following the opening of our new clubhouse on 30 August, 2025, this season marked our first full year operating from a modern, purpose-built facility. The impact has been immediate. Improved amenities, dedicated training spaces, and enhanced functionality have significantly lifted both member experience and operational capability. The clubhouse has quickly become a central hub for our members and the wider community, reinforcing our presence on Moore Park Beach.

A key focus this season has been strengthening our patrolling capacity. Our commitment to our “One Club, One Mission” vision continues to guide our efforts, with a clear strategic focus on achieving 40 active Bronze Medallion members. We are pleased to report the addition of five (5) new Bronze Medallion holders, representing a 45% increase in our active patrolling base. While numbers remain below our long-term target, this initial growth is a strong step forward. Our Club is positioned to expand from four patrol teams toward five in the coming season.

Membership growth has been a standout result this year, with an overall increase of approximately 30%. Nipper participation rose significantly from 33 to 52 members, reflecting strong family engagement and confidence in the Club's direction. Importantly, this growth has been supported by increased involvement from parents, volunteers, and new members stepping into active roles across the Club.

Our Silver Salties program has continued to develop as an important part of our community engagement strategy. With strong participation in monthly raffle nights and social activities, the program is not only fostering connection and wellbeing but also contributing to Club sustainability through fundraising and volunteer support.



This season also demonstrated the Club's capacity to deliver at scale, with the successful hosting of the Junior Branch Carnival. Welcoming approximately 500 competitors, officials, and visitors, the event showcased our Club's organisational capability, strengthened relationships across the Branch, and delivered meaningful economic and community benefit to the local area.

Despite these achievements, challenges remain. Our patrol base continues to operate under pressure, and the need to recruit, train, and retain active members remains critical. However, the progress made this season—particularly in membership growth, leadership development, and community engagement—provides a strong foundation to build upon.

As President, I am incredibly proud of the direction our Club is heading. This has been a year where we have moved beyond survival and into growth, with clear signs that our strategies are working. The energy within the Club is changing, and with it comes opportunity.

We are building something strong, sustainable, and community-driven—and the future of Moore Park Surf Life Saving Club has never looked more promising.

Congratulations to all patrol members on a fantastic 2025–2026 season. Reflecting on where our Club was only a few seasons ago, to now operating from a new clubhouse, has been a sensational journey and a testament to the dedication of our members.

I am particularly proud to see our patrol structure grow from three patrol groups to four. This achievement would not have been possible without the commitment of our current members, the enthusiasm of new members, and the support of our reserve patrol members. Across all four patrols, attendance has been strong throughout the season, and we have consistently been able to fill gaps and maintain patrol strength whenever members have been unavailable.

I would like to thank all members who assisted with water safety and IRB operations during this season's Branch Carnival at Moore Park (Beach) SLSC. The event was a tremendous success and a fantastic outcome for our Club and everyone involved. A special thank you and congratulations to all members who supported our Nippers throughout the day.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank all patrol members who have assisted with water safety during Sunday morning Nipper sessions throughout the season. Your support plays a vital role in providing a safe and enjoyable environment for our young members.

A shout out to Kim Miosge, our Junior Activities Coordinator, and her team on delivering a fantastic season. Nippers are a vital part of our Club, providing the foundation for the next generation of surf lifesavers, and your dedication and hard work are greatly appreciated.



When Bundaberg and the surrounding region experienced significant localised flooding, our patrol members did not hesitate to step forward and assist when called upon. I cannot thank you enough for your willingness to support the community during challenging circumstances. We were also called upon to assist in the search for a missing person in the flooded Burnett River, working alongside local authorities and other surf clubs in a coordinated response.

To keep us safe between the red and yellow, our patrol members did a collective 1,148.2 volunteer patrol hours. I'm happy to say this was spread fairly even through all patrol groups.

Something to look forward to, we have just taken possession of a brand-new Surf Rescue Jet Ski (RWC), this will be a huge asset to our patrol groups and our rescue capacity for many years to come.

At the commencement of the 2026/27 patrol season, we expect to have approximately eight qualified IRB drivers and four qualified RWC operators. This represents a substantial increase in our operational capability and will provide valuable support to our patrol teams throughout the season.

In general, all of our patrol equipment, including radios, remains in good working order. During the season, I removed the traditional "pineapples" used to secure the red and yellow flags and replaced them with feather-pole ground spikes, similar to those used for the black and white flags. This simple change means members no longer need to carry the heavy and awkward pineapples on and off the trailer and beach each patrol day, and the feedback from members has been overwhelmingly positive.

I would also like to thank Russell Blanchard, Surf Life Saving Queensland Wide Bay Lifeguard Supervisor, and his team of lifeguards who patrolled our beach on Saturdays throughout the season. Their support has been invaluable and has greatly assisted our volunteer patrol members.

Finally, to my dedicated team of volunteer patrol members, thank you for making this such a successful season. Your commitment, professionalism, dedication and teamwork are the foundation of everything we achieve, and you have made me proud to serve as your Club Captain.

Look forward to seeing you all again on the beach for the 26-27 season which I feel will be bigger and better.

A year to celebrate!

We had a record repeat at North Aussies and QLD Country selection and a team manager that was banned from the beach with repeated broken ankles. We celebrated our new club house and hosted a very successful branch carnival, so let's go back to the start of our season.



North Aussies – Mackay SLSC.

Isaac achieved an incredible three-peat GOLD Medal in Flags and earned selection in the Queensland Country Team. This outstanding achievement came after suffering a serious concussion that required hospitalisation and left him having to almost relearn how to walk. His determination and resilience throughout his recovery made this accomplishment even more remarkable.

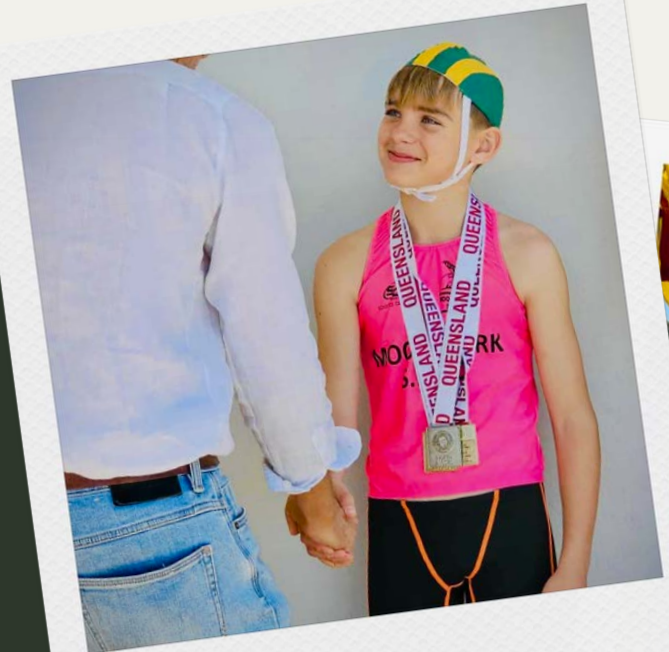

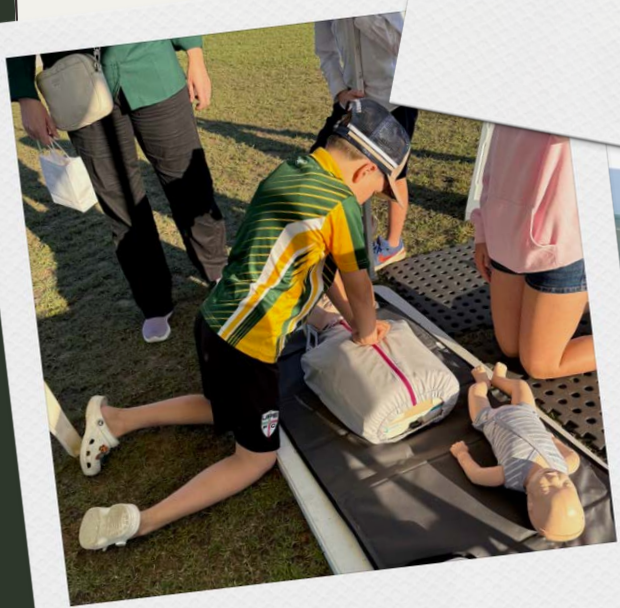


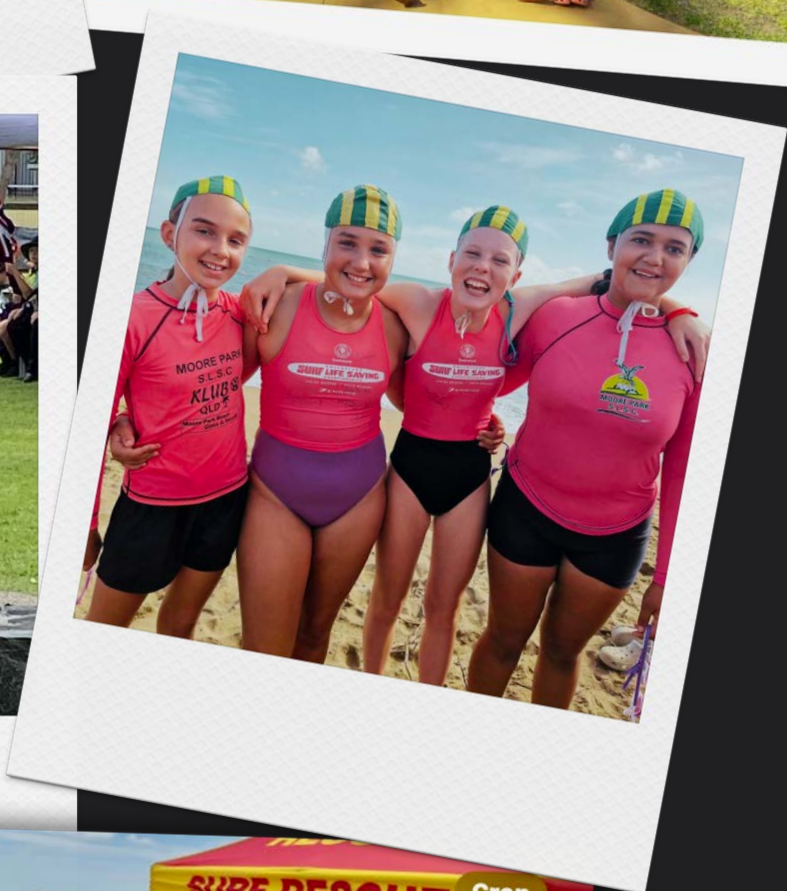

Treasurer's Report

This has been my first year as the Director of Finance for MPSLSC, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Directors for their support and patience throughout the year as I transitioned into this role, and particularly for their understanding and ongoing support during a period of bereavement.

The year has been particularly challenging from a financial administration perspective, with the Club transitioning its accounting system from an older version of MYOB, which was located on a single computer, to the online Xero accounting platform. The transition was not without its challenges, particularly as the two systems were not readily compatible. This required considerable work to transfer, reconcile and verify historical financial information while ensuring the Club's ongoing transactions were accurately recorded.

While the process presented some difficulties along the way, the move to Xero represents an important improvement in the Club's financial administration. The new online system provides greater accessibility, improved continuity and a stronger platform for the Club's financial management into the future.

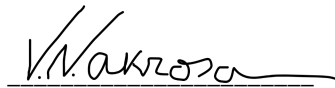

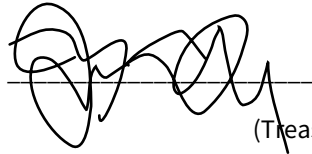

Notes to the Financial Statements

Moore Park Surf Life Saving Club

For the year ended 30 April 2026

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act of Queensland. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

Cash on Hand

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

These Financial Statements are audited. They must be read in conjunction with the attached Notes and Audit Report which form part of these Financial Statements.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Financial Assets

Investments in financial assets are initially recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at fair value, which is equivalent to their market bid price at the end of the reporting period. Movements in fair value are recognised through an equity reserve.

These Financial Statements are audited. They must be read in conjunction with the attached Notes and Audit Report which form part of these Financial Statements.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.
